I want to make plans, get ready, progress forward. I hate being in a holding pattern. I hate just having to wait!

But, like with all aspects of this crisis, grace endures. The Lord Jesus continues to walk with us and to teach us. I think he is teaching me (as he has been for a while now) to give up control, to live in the moment, to be attentive to what is happening *now*. We may think this time of isolation is wasted time, but Jesus does not waste time. He uses everything, always, for his glory and our good.
