Pastor's Note

It is always a big deal when a Pope comes to North America, but this last week's visit of Pope Francis to Canada is unique even amongst this already rare occurrence. Rather than a state visit or a celebration of an event like World Youth Day or the World Meeting of Family, Pope Francis has described this trip as a "penitential pilgrimage" – something relatively unheard of in the history of papal travel. Specifically, he has come to Canada to apologize for the role of Catholics in the indigenous boarding school system in that country. I recommend Crux's reporting ([here](#) and [here](#)) or the Pillar's [analysis](#).

I preached on these schools [a year ago](#), and I think those reflections are still valid. In addition, this section of one of Crux's articles caught my eye.

Although the residential schools were a government project, Catholic institutions had a leading role in running many of them.

"For this reason, I express my deep shame and sorrow, and, together with the bishops of this country, I renew my request for forgiveness for the wrong done by so many Christians to the Indigenous peoples," the pope said.

"It is tragic when some believers, as happened in that period of history, conform themselves to the conventions of the world rather than to the Gospel," Francis said.¹

We should have known better. Had we been true to our faith – a faith that has always deeply valued the integrity of the family and evangelized *through* culture, not in opposition to it – we could have avoided the need for this pilgrimage. Instead, we gave ourselves over to "the conventions of the world", the latest and most enlightened societal program, which made us complicit in serious, intergeneration harm to an entire culture. The Gospel will always make us holy; the World, less so.²

Nevertheless, even, and especially if "everyone was doing it," Pope Francis' witness is prophetic. If someone has been harmed – *sinned against* – then the excuses and reasons do not matter. The apology, without caveats or backtracking, matters. We only have control over ourselves, and if we have sinned, we must show contrition and do penance for that sin, in big sins, like systemic abuses against Indigenous Peoples, and in small sins, like against those in our own household.

Nota del Pastor

Siempre es un asunto importante cuando el Papa viene a América del Norte, pero la visita del Papa Francisco a Canadá de la semana pasada es única incluso entre esta ocurrencia ya rara. En lugar de una visita de Estado o una celebración de un evento como la Jornada Mundial de la Juventud o el Encuentro Mundial de la Familia, el Papa Francisco ha descrito este viaje como una "peregrinación penitencial", algo relativamente inaudito en la historia de los viajes papales. Específicamente, ha venido a Canadá para disculparse por el papel de los católicos en el sistema de internados indígenas en ese país. Recomiendo el informe de Crux ([aquí](#) y [aquí](#) en inglés) o el análisis del [Pilar](#) (en inglés).

Prediqué sobre estas escuelas [hace un año](#), y creo que esas reflexiones siguen siendo válidas. Además, esta sección de uno de los artículos de Crux me llamó la atención.

Aunque las escuelas residenciales eran un proyecto del gobierno, las instituciones católicas tenían un papel de liderazgo en la gestión de muchas de ellas.

"Por esta razón, expreso mi profunda vergüenza y dolor, y, junto con los obispos de este país, renuevo mi petición de perdón por el mal hecho por tantos cristianos a los pueblos indígenas", dijo el Papa.

"Es trágico cuando algunos creyentes, como sucedió en ese período de la historia, se conforman a las convenciones del mundo en lugar de al Evangelio", dijo Francisco.

Deberíamos haberlo sabido mejor. Si hubiéramos sido fieles a nuestra fe, una fe que siempre ha valorado profundamente la integridad de la familia y evangelizada a través de la cultura, no en oposición a ella, podríamos haber evitado la necesidad de esta peregrinación. En cambio, nos entregamos a "las convenciones del mundo", el último y más ilustrado programa social, que nos hizo cómplices de un grave daño intergeneracional a toda una cultura. El Evangelio siempre nos hará santos; el mundo, menos.

Sin embargo, incluso, y especialmente si "todo el mundo lo estaba haciendo", el testimonio del Papa Francisco es profético. Si alguien ha sido perjudicado, *- pecado en contra -*, entonces las excusas y las razones no importan. La disculpa, sin advertencias ni retrocesos, importa. Solo tenemos control sobre nosotros mismos, y si hemos pecado, debemos mostrar contrición y hacer penitencia por ese pecado, en grandes pecados, como abusos sistémicos contra los pueblos indígenas, y en pecados pequeños, como contra los de nuestro propio hogar.
