Pastor's Note

In 10 days, I am headed down to Dallas for a priest and deacons conference being put on by the Evangelical Catholic (<https://evangelicalcatholic.org/>), the organization our parish has been consulting with since shortly before COVID. This is the group that has provided the materials and guidance for our Missionary Training (small group leader) programs, who put on the first two nights of our parish retreat last summer, and who provided the Next Step program we went through this Fall. They are also currently working with two members of our Hispanic Community to offer a Missionary Training in Spanish.


I love two things about the EC. First, they are deeply grounded in the Second Vatican Council's reemphasis of lay mission. *By their baptism*, all Christians have a mission to preach the Gospel, but in many eras of the Church that mission has been entrusted exclusively to a professional class, sometimes priests and religious, sometimes paid parish staff. But the fact of the matter is that *all* Christians must preach the Gospel, and the EC's programs are entirely oriented towards giving laypeople the tools they need to carry this mission out. [I suppose it is ironic that, given this commitment, the EC would offer a conference exclusively for priests, to which they later added deacons; but even if all Christians have a mission, it is the job of the clergy to call people to that mission and to help guide that mission, so you do often have to start with the priests who run parishes.]

The second thing I love about the EC is that they are *competent*. They produce a lot of materials, all of which seem grounded in pastoral experience and a real understanding of the path of discipleship. With my background in engineering, I love a good system. The EC is deeply systematic, and their systems seem to *work*. When I am frustrated with slow progress or lack of results in my work with the EC, it almost always ends up that the struggle comes on my end, from failing to implement their system as rigorously as they are suggesting.

We are two-and-a-half years into our work with the EC, so you might be wondering why you haven't seen any effect on our parish if I am this invested in them. The answer is that the EC system – and really any good parish program – is not evaluated by fliers or advertisements or even awareness; it is evaluated by lives brought into deep relationship with Jesus Christ. If there has been any effect, it will be seen in the prayer life and devotion of your fellow parishioners, in their dedication to the Lord Jesus, and in their increased frequency in inviting their family and friends into conversations about faith and salvation. If you desire any of these things for yourself, maybe start with the Next Step cards, which are still in the backside of our bulletin board kiosk.

And stay tuned. Right now, we are in a season of solidifying the work we have already done with the EC, but this conference may help me discern what happens after that.

Nota del Pastor

En 10 días me dirijo a Dallas para una conferencia de sacerdotes y diáconos organizada por el Católico Evangélico (<https://evangelicalcatholic.org/> en inglés), la organización con la que nuestra parroquia ha estado consultando desde poco antes de COVID. Este es el grupo que ha proporcionado los materiales y la orientación para nuestros programas de Capacitación Misional (líder de grupos pequeños), que organizó las dos primeras noches de nuestro retiro parroquial el verano pasado, y que proporcionó el programa Next Step que pasamos este otoño. También están trabajando actualmente con dos miembros de nuestra comunidad hispana para ofrecer una capacitación misional en español.

Me encantan dos cosas de la CE. En primer lugar, están profundamente arraigados en el nuevo énfasis del Concilio Vaticano II en la misión laical. *Por su bautismo*, todos los cristianos tienen la misión de predicar el Evangelio, pero en muchas épocas de la Iglesia esa misión ha sido confiada exclusivamente a una clase profesional, a veces sacerdotes y religiosos, a veces personal parroquial remunerado. Pero el hecho es que *todos* los cristianos deben predicar el Evangelio, y los programas de la CE están totalmente orientados a dar a los laicos las herramientas que necesitan para llevar a cabo esta misión. [Supongo que es irónico que, dado este compromiso, la CE ofreciera una conferencia exclusivamente para sacerdotes, a la que luego agregaron diáconos; pero incluso si todos los cristianos tienen una misión, es el trabajo del clero llamar a las personas a esa misión y ayudar a guiar esa misión, por lo que a menudo hay que comenzar con los sacerdotes que dirigen las parroquias.]

Lo segundo que me encanta de las CE es que son *competentes*. Producen muchos materiales, todos los cuales parecen basados en la experiencia pastoral y una comprensión real del camino del discipulado. Con mi experiencia en ingeniería, me encanta un buen sistema. Las CE son profundamente sistemáticas y sus sistemas parecen *funcionar*. Cuando me siento frustrado por el lento progreso o la falta de resultados en mi trabajo con la CE, casi siempre termina la lucha de mi parte, por no implementar su sistema tan rigurosamente como sugieren.

Llevamos dos años y medio en nuestro trabajo con el CE, por lo que tal vez se pregunte por qué no ha visto ningún efecto en nuestra parroquia si estoy tan involucrado en ellos. La respuesta es que el sistema de la CE – y realmente cualquier buen programa parroquial – no es evaluado por volantes o anuncios o incluso conciencia; se evalúa por vidas llevadas a una relación profunda con Jesucristo. Si ha habido algún efecto, se verá en la vida de oración y devoción de sus compañeros feligreses, en su dedicación al Señor Jesús y en su mayor frecuencia al invitar a sus familiares y amigos a conversaciones sobre la fe y la salvación. Si desea alguna de estas cosas para usted, tal vez comience con las tarjetas Next Step, que todavía están en la parte posterior de nuestro quiosco de tablón de anuncios.

Y estad atentos. En este momento, estamos en una temporada de solidificación del trabajo que ya hemos hecho con la CE, pero esta conferencia puede ayudarme a discernir lo que sucederá después de eso.
